ADMISSIONS

Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program recommended. 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics, 3 units of science (including 2 units of lab), 2 units of foreign language, 1 unit of social studies, 2 units of history, 2 units of academic electives, and 1 unit of computer proficiency recommended. Minimum combined SAT Reasoning score of 860 (composite ACT score of 18) required. R.N. required of nursing program applicants. Audition required of music program applicants. Conditional admission and TRIO Program for applicants not normally admissible. SAT Reasoning or ACT required. The SAT or ACT writing component used for placement and advising. TOEFL required of international applicants. Campus visit recommended. Application fee \$25 (may be waived in cases of financial need), nonrefundable.

Basis for Candidate Selection

Academic: Secondary school record and standardized test scores very important. Class rank important. Recommendations considered.
Nonacademic: Character/personal qualities very important. Extracurricular activities, particular talent/ability, alumni/ae relationship, and volunteer work considered.

Admissions Procedure

Normal sequence: SAT Reasoning or ACT scores must be received by August 15. Suggest filing application by June 1; deadline is August 15. Common application form accepted. Notification of admission is sent on a rolling basis. Reply is required by June 1. \$200 tuition deposit, refundable until June 1. 4% of freshmen enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. In fall 2010, 614 transfer applications were received, 364 were accepted. Application deadline is August 15 for fall; November 15 for spring; March 15 for summer. Minimum 16 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. College transcript required. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required. Lowest course grade accepted is "C." Maximum number of transferable semester hours is 60 from two-year schools; 90 from four-year schools. At least 17 semester hours must be completed at the school to earn an associate degree; 32 to earn a bachelor's degree.

International Students: 26 degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled, 22 countries represented. Minimum 525 TOEFL score required. Advance deposit and preapplication form required. Application deadline is June 1 for fall; November 20 for spring; April 15 for summer.

Learning Disabled Students: Personal interview recommended. Specific support program available. Untimed standardized tests accepted. Credit toward degree may be granted for remedial courses. Lighter course load and additional time to complete degree permitted. Program/services serve 63 identified students.

Placement Options: Credit may be granted for CLEP general exams, CLEP subject exams, Regents College Exams, challenge exams, and life experience. Credit and placement may be granted for military experience.

Freshman Class Profile

For fall 2010, 60% of 1,542 applicants were offered admission. 37% of those accepted matriculated.

Expenses

Tuition (2011-12): \$15,500 per year. Room & Board: \$5,200. Required fees: \$1,370. Books (school's estimate): \$1,150.

Financial Aid

Needs analysis based on federal methodology. FAFSA and school's own aid form: Priority filing date is June 1. Notification of awards begins

March 1. In 2010, the average aid package of full-time undergraduates with financial need was \$13,514; \$13,814 for full-time freshmen. 14% of students receiving financial aid participated in Federal Work-Study Program. 74% of 2010 graduates incurred an average debt of \$26,440. Of full-time undergraduates receiving need-based financial aid, an average of 63% of need was met.

Scholarships and Grants

Need-based Federal Pell, SEOG, and state scholarships/grants. Non-need-based academic merit and athletic scholarships/grants. On average, 82 non-need-based athletic scholarships are awarded with an average amount of \$6,436. In 2010, \$7,529,107 in need-based scholarships/grants and \$1,099,773 in non-need-based scholarships/grants was awarded.

Academic Requirements

Two semester hours of physical education required. 12 semester hours of religion/theology required. Core curriculum required. Every student is required to take a computer course. Freshmen must maintain minimum 1.7 GPA; sophomores, 1.9 GPA; juniors, 2.0 GPA; seniors, 2.25 GPA.

Academic Programs

Minors offered in all majors. Self-designed majors. Double majors. Dual degrees. Honors program. Pass/fail grading option. Internships. Weekend College. Distance Learning. Cooperative education programs in engineering, health professions, and athletic trainer. Teacher certification in early childhood, elementary, middle/junior high, secondary, special, and bilingual/bicultural education and in 14 specific subject areas. Graduate programs offered; qualified undergraduates may take graduate-level classes. Preprofessional programs in law, medicine, veterinary science, pharmacy, and dentistry. 2-2 engineering program. Facilities

Academic Experience

61% of freshmen return for their sophomore year. Average GPA of freshmen after first year is 3.1 on a 4.0 scale. 48% of freshmen graduate within six years. The most popular majors among recent graduates were business, education, and nursing. 25% of graduates pursue further study immediately. 84% of graduates are employed in major field within two years.

Guidance Facilities/Student Services

Remedial learning services. Nonremedial tutoring. Placement service. Health service. Career services include internships, career/job search classes, interest inventory, on-campus job interviews, resume assistance, alumni network, and interview training. Minority student, veteran student, older student, career, personal, academic, psychological, and religious counseling. International student support services include special counselors/advisors. LD student support services include remedial English, remedial math, remedial reading, note-taking services, oral tests, readers, tutors, reading machines, tape recorders, untimed tests, learning center, extended time for tests, and other testing accommodations. Handicapped student services include note-taking services, tape recorders, tutors, reader services, adaptive equipment, and talking books. Campus is partially accessible to the physically handicapped.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Athletics

Intercollegiate baseball, basketball, cross-country, golf, soccer for men. Intercollegiate basketball, cross-country, golf, soccer, softball, volleyball for women. GENERAL

Housing

All students under age 21 must live on campus unless living with family. Women's and men's dormitories; student apartments; married student housing. 34% of all undergraduates (99% of all freshmen) live in school-owned/-operated/-affiliated housing.

Regulations and Policies

Alcohol prohibited on campus. Class attendance policies set by individual instructors. Dress/hair code. Honor code. Hazing and smoking prohibited. Attendance is mandatory for chapel four days per week. All students may have cars on campus; 95% of students have cars.

Environment/Transportation

120-acre, urban campus in Lubbock (population: 225,859).

Calendar

Semester system; classes begin in late August and mid-January. Four summer sessions, one of 12 weeks and three of four weeks each. Orientation for new students held in August.
